Neighborhood Evacuation Drills

A How-To for Neighborhood Groups





Your group/organization, even a few folks with some time, can champion the effort for an evacuation exercise

# Getting Started



Realize, it doesn't have to be a complicated event – 1 or 2 hours, that's it.





Neighborhoods are interested and want to participate and have conversation – neighbor to neighbor





### **Date**

When can most (or all) participate?

Consider weekends/holidays.



### Time

Does morning or evening work better for the neighborhood?

You will need a 2-hour block of time for the drill – talk about it as a group.

Don't forget to have some fun getting to know the folks **you** may depend on in an emergency



## Where to go/meet

If your group has an established rally point, use that in the practice.

Or identify a point where neighbors go to during the drill.

Use that place or have a meeting location for discussion on how it went after (it could even be in someone's front yard)

## Prior to the date



## Talk with neighbors and let them know about the exercise

Publicize in flyers or neighborhood email/social media groups

Or simply go door-to-door – a personal invitation from a neighbor goes a long way!



## Provide preparedness information as an icebreaker

What to have in a go-bag

Considerations for home evacuation

- •Can you get your garage door open with no power?
- •Can you master two exit routes (this may be a freeway alternate for some evacuations)

Sonoma County Department of Emergency Management has materials for you, just ask!



## Inform your local public safety agencies - let them know what is happening

Can they support in some way? If they can, great! Remember, the important ingredients here are you and your neighbors.

# Day of event



#### Consider ways to notify the group

Maybe going door-to-door to announce the start
Or maybe a group text message reminder



## Neighbors should be going about their routine

No head starts on getting ready to leave



#### At the selected time:

Neighbors get their go-bag
Prep their house to leave (lock doors, etc.)
Load their car as they would need to
Leave their house
Exit the neighborhood

# Wrapping it up – grow the neighborhood connection

#### At the meeting location:

- Consider having a snacks & drinks potluck to get neighbors to stay and chat
- Talk about the experience
- What did neighbors learn
- Any neighbors who might need help leaving
- Traffic/road issues
- What the group will do next
  - 5 neighbors list (3 across the street & 1 each side)
  - Open your garage door exercise





# Planning Checklist

#### Before the Event

- Date
- Time
- Meet Location
- Advertise event
- Get collateral materials ready
- Inform local public safety agencies

## Day of Event

- Text or door to door reminder if possible
- Everybody OUT
- Meeting location refreshments if appropriate
- Designated person to lead short discussion (page 6 for ideas)
- Designated person to take notes
- Plan a follow up meeting
